Active chapter size: 101. The chapter sent two men to the Chicago Leadership Summit and one man to the Chapter Executives Conference.

Active chapter size: 100; winter pledges: 6. The chapter sent two men to the Chapter Executives Conference.

2. Target Freshmen!

The demands of the team are not as great on freshmen. It is natural that as the demands of the team become greater upon the players the more unlikely it is they will make time for Pi Kappa Alpha. If you can show them the value early, you can gain their commitment for life.

3. Utilize the Summer!

The demands of sports are not as great during the summer season. Freshman members of a varsity team may be more receptive to a fraternity during the summer. This is a time when school may be in session but there are significantly less students on campus – thus PIKE offers an expansion of the friendships they desire outside of their teams.



4. Impress Individuality!

As with every other recruit, it is personality and attitude that makes an athlete PIKE material, not their ability on the playing field. Treat him as a person, not an athlete. A varsity athlete will want to get outside of the sport he plays. He needs friends who are not athletes and he needs time to express himself in other ways. Be careful not to focus your conversation on athletics, but rather on the person.

5. Recognize Special Needs!

Particularly during the sports season, make sure your potential recruit understands what is expected and that you understand the extent to which he can commit. Varsity athletes contribute to the chapter in ways that no other brothers can. You want these men because of who and what they are, but you should realize that they have extraordinary demands placed upon them. You should do your best to accommodate them – but when they come to Pi Kappa Alpha they should leave their equipment behind and concentrate on being a brother.

6. Be Flexible!

Offer an accelerated new member education program to accommodate demanding schedules.

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Delta Nu Chapter Will Celebrate 55 Years of PiKA

In November 1946, Robert Duff and John Penner were inspired to create a league of gentleman of similar beliefs on the campus of Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan. Scholarship, service and brotherhood was the foundation upon which their fraternity would be built. Local fraternities Delta Upsilon and Sigma Nu strongly coincided with these beliefs, so the name Delta Nu was born.

In spring 1947, Delta Nu Fraternity was recognized by Wayne State as a local fraternity. Due to quick successes on campus these gentlemen dreamt of becoming part of something larger and so they set out to find an international fraternity that matched the ideals set forth. Pi Kappa Alpha closely matched the ideals of these men so on January 1, 1950 a petition to charter a chapter was filed with the Fraternity's Supreme Council. Pi Kappa Alpha honored the petition and was preparing to charter the chapter.

Pi Kappa Alpha chapter names are generated on the Greek alphabet and Delta Mu was the next chapter name to be used. The men of Delta Nu realized that, coincidentally, if they waited until one more chapter was chartered, they would receive the Delta Nu designation. After a three-week wait, the University of Southern Mississippi chapter was chartered as Delta Mu Chapter, and on February 4, 1950 a dynasty was born at Wayne State as Delta Nu Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha.

The annual event raised over \$12,000 as the brothers walked 120 miles, split into several 11 mile shifts. The fraternity has hosted this event for the past three years and has raised more than \$35,000 for the organization. They were awarded the IFC Most Outstanding Philanthropy two years in a row. Many brothers are in the Order of Omega or involved in student government. The chapter has twelve brothers in the SGA senate, and two brothers serve on the IFC. The chapter raised twice as much for philanthropy as did any other Greek organization on campus. Epsilon Mu is leading in the fraternity league intramurals.

Active chapter size: 72; winter pledges: 1. The chapter sent three men to the Chapter Executives Conference.

The chapter is represented on the swim and soccer teams, and one brother is a DSU cheerleader. Their members are involved in the following campus organizations: student government, the Union Program Council, Student Alumni Association, orientations leaders, as well as honor societies such as Phi Eta Sigma, Omicron Delta Kappa, and Phi Kappa Phi. How To Recruit Varsity Athletes
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7. Get Involved!

Show up to athletic events, including practices, with the chapter. Show that Pi Kappa Alpha sets the standard at our host institutions and supports all brothers in any endeavors they undertake. This will impress the coach as well.

8. Meet the coach!

Be courteous, dress sharp, explain that Pi Kappa Alpha is a different type of organization, that it is a life-long commitment. Learn from him what the coach demands of his players, and explain how you can work together to create the best student athletes. Emphasize you are not going to impact the team's performance. He will likely offer you recommendations of athletes he thinks will make good fraternity men. If he is not receptive to giving you recommendations, he will still appreciate your courtesy and will look more favorably upon PIKE than those who do not make personal contact.



9. Be Sincere!

Do not ask players to recruit other players. Do not imply that the reason they have become a member is so that the chapter can use them to recruit more players. All men should be made to feel that they are being recruited for themselves. If you have a brother on a team, he should bring other athletes around and introduce them to the active chapter; however, the actual recruiting should be done by the recruitment chairmen or designated athletic recruiter. Having other varsity athletes in the chapter will undoubtedly make the recruit more comfortable, but he should be exposed to the entire chapter rather than isolated into one category.

10. Do Not Fear The Recruit!

They are the ones who are nervous and potentially even scared. Approach with confidence; a positive attitude sells itself.

Remember: The essence of recruiting anyone is making a friend!

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
